

Dear Sustainable Kingston Community,

2015 was a year of transition for the Sustainable Kingston Corporation (SKC). It was a year marked by numerous changes both in staff and Board membership and by much uncertainty regarding the prospective terms and conditions of a renewed Service Level Agreement (SLA) with the City of Kingston. To that end, a strategic planning exercise was undertaken to review and articulate, not only where the organization was going and the actions needed to make real progress, but also to identify the key indicators for assessing future success.

The chief outcome of the strategic planning process was the identification of a set of objectives with measurable targets that focused SK resources and capabilities around the following four outcomes: namely that

- we expand our organizational strength through the development of meaningful and accountable relationships and the strategic use and leveraging of resources;
- we grow a sustainable (smart and livable) City through promoting learning and development opportunities in our Community;
- we report out on and celebrate the results of sustainability success across our Community; and
- we build our local and global standing through excellence in sustainability research and practice.

Following the strategic planning exercise, and with renewed focus and energy, the SKC Board of Directors turned its attention to working with the City of Kingston to develop a proposal for a new SLA to support the continued operation and growth of SKC. Following a delegation by two Board members at the meeting of Kingston City Council held on July 14, 2015, Council approved the renewal of a three year SLA with SKC. Key to this approval was the clear expectation that SKC would engage in a number of revenue generation processes to supplement, and eventually replace, the funding currently provided through the SLA.

Hiring additional competent staff was an essential factor in assuring that Sustainable Kingston becomes an effective organization. This process began with the approval of the SLA and continued to a very successful completion by the year's end.

Throughout the spring and summer, and while the Board worked to secure the new SLA, SKC continued to operate with very limited staffing and an uncertain future, to develop and deliver programs in our community which included: Kingston Unplugged; an offthe-grid music concert celebrating Earth Hour and inspiring community action on climate change; Pitch-in Kingston, an annual community clean-up event that involves local workplaces, sports teams, community groups, schools, and individuals in a Citywide spring clean-up after the winter snow disappears; and the Rain Barrels Art with Impact campaign to raise awareness about water conservation. Also, in partnership with Sustainable Eastern Ontario, and funded by a Trillium Grant, SKC continued to host the capacity Building Workshop Series which provide opportunities for non-profit organizations to learn about best practices in pertinent topics such as board governance and social media training, and how to tap into funding streams.

New to this year's roster of activities was the Sydenham Street

Revived project, a pop-up park that took place in Kingston on Sydenham Street between Princess and Queen from August 27th until September 13th. The project explored the potential for a pedestrian-friendly design for Sydenham Street while challenging ideas about public places in the downtown core. It was truly a community event in the way that it involved citizens through the organization of public design workshops to develop a collective vision for the public space. The project inspired the donation of landscaping and food services and showcased local art and music.

In the fall of 2015, with the SLA signed and with the release of the Ontario Trillium funds for developing and implementing the Green Economy Kingston Program, SKC turned its attention to hiring a new Executive Director and two new staff, bringing our total staff members to four.

Going into 2016 with a very strong team that will ensure the successful implementation of the terms and conditions of the SLA as well as the successful reporting and use of the Ontario Trillium Funds, the SK Board will be seeking a new home which will meet our expanding needs. We are also opening the Board of Directors to welcome up to three more active members. Early in the New Year we will continue to prepare for the launch of Green Economy Kingston in March of 2016 as well as work with our community partners to initiate and apply for funding for two or three strategic projects that support the goals and objectives of the Sustainable Kingston Plan.

With a great new staff and a revitalized and expanded Board, we are excited as we enter 2016 with the highest expectations for a significant furtherance of each of the pillars of sustainability, for the collective good and well-being of the whole Kingston community.

PITCH-IN KINGSTON (APRIL)

Pitch-In Kingston is an annual city-wide cleanup effort powered by volunteers from local workplaces, sports teams, community groups, and schools. The event beautifies our community, improves its environmental health, and demonstrates how lots of small actions can have a big impact on our neighbourhoods.



GREAT LAKE WATER FESTIVAL (JUNE)

Elementary school students from across the Kingston area gathered at Lake Ontario Park on June 4th for a day of fun and information on a broad range of topics involving water at the inaugural Great Lakes Water Festival. Organizers include Queen's University, KFL&A Public Health, Utilities Kingston, Cataraqui Region Conservation Authority, Limestone District School Board, RBC, the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change, Ontario Provincial Police, Sustainable Kingston, and the Katarowki Indigenous Grandmothers Council.









Sustainable Kingston, in partnership with Utilities Kingston, launched its 2015 Rain Barrels - Art with Impact campaign to raise awareness of water conservation and related issues. Sustainable Kingston provided six local artists - David Dossett, Kathleen Hendry, Brenda Wight, Joanne Gervais, Morris Blanchard, and Yessica Rivera Belsham - with one barrel each for them to use as a canvas to create a unique piece of art. The barrels were auctioned online July 6th - 20th.

COMMUNITY WATER CHAMPIONS FVFNT

(June) On June 30th Sustainable
Kingston held a special "sneak peek" of
the Art With Impact artist-painted rain
barrels prior to the launch of the online
auction. Our local water champions,
including KFL&A Public Health, the City
of Kingston, Utilities Kingston, Friends
of the Inner Harbour, and the Queen's
Water Research Centre, were invited to
see the barrels, meet the artists, and
share information about their projects
and initiatives. This information was
used to fuel our #WaterWednesday
social media awareness campaign.









SYDENHAM STREET REVIVED



(August - September) Sydenham Street Revived (SSR) was a pop-up park that took place in Kingston on Sydenham Street between Princess and Queen from August 27th until September 13th. The project was a collaboration between the ad-hoc community group Sydenham Street Revived and Sustainable Kingston, and was supported by many residents, local businesses, and Sustainable Kingston Community Partners. The full list of project supporters can be found at the front of this document. A special thanks to Western Landscape Services for helping to green the street.

The purpose of the SSR pop-up park was to test out a fun and engaging pedestrian-friendly design for Sydenham Street and to evaluate its impact before the start of the next phase of the downtown reconstruction project (also known as the Big Dig). In addition to landscaping and seating, SSR provided opportunities to showcase local art and to bring people together for small-scale, community-driven events.

Fostering community ownership of the temporary public space was one of the most important goals of the project. To do this, the community was engaged in a number of ways, including

- A public Design and Ideas Workshop in which residents were asked the question, How would you revive Sydenham Street? The workshops took place over two days (June 17th and 20th), and over 40 residents took part.
- Local community groups, artists, innovators, and performers were invited to animate the space with art and activities, and dozens took the opportunity to do so.

In 2015, Sustainable Kingston continued to prepare for the launch of its first flagship program – Green Economy Kingston. For organizations looking to grow their competitive advantage through sustainability, Green Economy Kingston will provide the guidance, resources, and networks needed to set greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions reduction targets, and recognize its members for their progress. The membership-based program is based off Sustainable Waterloo Region's Regional Carbon Initiative, with guidance from Sustainability CoLab.

In November, Sustainable Kingston hired the Program Manager for Green Economy Kingston – Liam Conway – who brings to the position a wealth of experience in working with businesses to measure and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. After growing up in Kingston, Liam had previously been working in Toronto with the carbon management firm Carbonzero and the environment, social, and governance research firm Sustainalytics.

A major milestone that came out of 2015 was the initial development of the Target-Setting Framework, which sets out the rules of the game and minimum requirements for organizations setting GHG reduction targets through the program. Sustainable Kingston involved local subject matter experts to help develop the parameters of the Framework, which focuses on delivering upon its three guiding principles:

- Simplicity: The Framework must be straight forward and easy to understand.
- Accessibility: The Framework must promote inclusivity, and ensure the program is accessible to as many organizations as possible.
- $\bullet \quad \text{Credibility:} \\ \text{The Framework must promote meaningful GHG emissions reductions amongst participants.}$

We continue to look forward to the March 2016 Launch Event and the first year of the program's operation.
